#### Eastertime: A Sense of the Season

The keeping of the forty days of Lent took us through most of March and has now delivered us into April. We may still be refraining from something we otherwise enjoy, or perhaps even still praying and doing good works. In April the noticeably lengthening days remind us that lencten, the old word for lengthening, is the origin of the season's name. The longer, brighter days might be lifting our spirits after the colder, shorter days around Ash Wednesday, making us cheerful, even joyful, like the crowds exuberantly cheering Jesus as he entered Jerusalem on the first Palm Sunday, shouting:

"Hosanna to the Son of David, the King of Israel.

Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord.

Hosanna in the highest."

We celebrate Palm Sunday on 13th April this year. We too shall gather in Warnford Churchyard at 9.30am and Commemorate the Lord's entry into Jerusalem with Palm fronds and crosses and singing joyfully. We shall then make our way, equally joyfully, to West Meon for our service at 10.30am. Just as the mood of the crowd changed, so too will the tone of the Liturgy, changing from triumph to hearing St Luke's account of Jesus' Passion – his mental suffering after the Last Supper, his arrest and verbal and physical abuse at the hands of the Temple authorities and the Romans and his Crucifixion.

We mark the Last Supper and the events of Gethsemane together at East Meon on Maundy Thursday (6pm on 17th April). The next day, Good Friday, we walk again in witness from Warnford to Langrish, where we shall spend an hour until 3pm reflecting on the Cross and hearing the words of St John's account of the Passion. We leave the church in silence at 3pm and keep watch until the joyful news of the resurrection, which we shall celebrate in all four of our group's churches on Easter morning. But Christians must remember that the death and resurrection of Jesus cannot be separated. The meaning of these days is distorted when we imagine that all we are doing is recalling the final events in the life of Jesus in a sort of historical review. We miss the point in that case. The mystery of Jesus' death and resurrection is a present reality; the boundaries of time, and the boundaries of death, have no power for us in Jesus.

So, after the three days of Christ's passion, dying and rising, we can truly delight in the remainder of April and into May for fifty days, with rejoicing, feasting and giving witness! The season of Easter is fifty days long. It is a time of unbridled joy, of exuberant rejoicing. The fifty days from Easter Sunday to Pentecost should be celebrated in joyful exultation as one feast day, or better as one 'great Sunday.' These, above all others, are days for the singing of 'Alleluia'.

Why fifty days?

The ancient cultures that gave us the Bible had great respect for numbers. They believed that numbers contained hints about God and the meaning of life. The number seven was thought to contain fullness: there are seven days in the week, according to God's original way of ordering time, creating all that there is and resting. So if you multiply 7 times 7, you have a 'fullness of fullness'.

But wait, 7x7 is 49! With God, there is always more - more than we can ever imagine. So our holy season of Easter is even more than a fullness of fullness. It is a fullness of fullness and then some more. That's what God's love is like - more than we can ever imagine. That's what heaven is going to be like - more than we can ever imagine.

The fifty days are days for looking for the risen Lord among us. Together, like the apostles who were so full of the Spirit that people thought they were drunk, we rush about with good and giddy news - Death is not the last word! Life and love are forever! And slowly, painstakingly, we work together, together with Christ, to change this world into the world to come. Sing 'Alleluia!' or better still 'Alleluia! Alleluia!

May the path of this April build ever greater joy in your hearts and may you be blest by the Good News of the Risen Christ and be sustained by the Spirit he sent into the world.

## **Rainfall February to March**

In spite of the old adage of 'February fill dyke' the month of February started remarkably dry and up to the 15th of the month we had only had 13.7mms (0.53"). However from the 19th to the 26th we had a really wet period and in those 8 days we had another 77.6mms (3.1" so that February ended with 92.1mms (3.6").

March has seen very little rain and up to the 13th we have only measured 1.3mms. In the year to mid-March we have had 253.8mms (10"). This compares with 331.9mms (13.06") in 2024.

# The loss of the R101

A hundred years ago many people thought the future of long distance air travel lay not with aeroplanes but with airships – huge aircraft lifted by hydrogen. The British Government embarked on a very expensive programme to build airships which would link the furthest corners of the Empire. The first to be completed made a successful return maiden flight to Canada in 1930, but the second, the R101, attempted a similar flight to India a few weeks later and crashed with the loss of almost everyone on board.

Kit will describe the reasons for what has been called "a terrible, predictable and totally unnecessary catastrophe". The loss of the R101 was a national disaster and dealt a severe blow to Britain's prestige and respect for its technical ability. The incident put a stop to all airship development in Britain, but the airship would have had no place in World War II and perhaps the release of resources was fortuitous.

## The Charming Chaffinch

As the seasons shift, the countryside and gardens across Hampshire are alive with birds searching for food and a mate. Among them is one of the UK's most familiar and striking finches - the chaffinch. The chaffinch is one of the UK's most common birds, with an estimated population of over 6 million breeding pairs in summer.

Throughout winter, chaffinches gather in large flocks, often made up of birds that have migrated from Continental Europe, arriving from late October onwards. Those seen alone or in small groups within suburban gardens are more likely to be year-round residents.

As early spring approaches, these winter gatherings break apart as males establish territories and search for a mate. Males put on a lively courtship display, singing to attract a female while performing fluttering flights and spreading their tails to show off their vibrant plumage. Once paired, they remain monogamous for the season, the female will build a well-hidden nest using moss, grass, and spider silk.

The males are especially striking, with pinkish underparts, blue-grey caps, and rich chestnut backs. Females are more subtly coloured in shades of brown, giving them excellent camouflage. Male chaffinches learn their songs rather than being born with them, and different regions have distinct 'dialects.' Their song, a rapid, descending 'rain of notes', becomes more prominent as spring approaches.

The species' latin name, Fringilla coelebs, means 'bachelor finch'. This name was given by

the famous Swedish naturalist Carl Linnaeus, who noticed that male chaffinches in Scandinavia migrated south for the winter, while many females stayed behind.

Chaffinches can be seen in woodland and hedgerows, and prefer a mix of dense trees and open areas, perfect for searching for seeds. They often forage beneath trees using their strong beaks to crack open fallen seeds.

One of the best Hampshire & Isle of Wight Wildlife Trust nature reserves to see them at is Blashford Lakes Nature Reserve. With well-positioned hides and feeding stations, visitors have an excellent chance of spotting these birds up close.

While chaffinches are primarily seed-eaters in winter, they shift their diet in spring and summer, feeding on insects to nourish their young. If you'd like to encourage chaffinches into your garden, sunflower seeds and mixed seed blends are ideal, especially in winter when natural food sources are scarce. Although they will happily visit bird tables, they do not feed openly on feeders, preferring to hop about on the ground and under hedges instead.



This half term has flown by and we appear to have reached our Easter break very quickly. That said, the amount of learning the children have done this term, at our school, is incredible. It has been argued that education encompasses the acquisition of knowledge, skills and the development of character, through formal and informal experiences. The wide and varied curriculum offered to children at West Meon Primary is designed to support the development of well-rounded individuals through formal and informal experiences. Reading is always a focus in primary education, and at West Meon we made the most of World Book Day by making it an event that lasted the week. Having fun while reading and enjoying books is at the centre of the National Curriculum's 'Reading for Pleasure' objective and our pupils were enthusiastic when they took a field trip to the local Petersfield Library. There the children took part in activities to improve their knowledge of the library and were able to sign up for library cards.

It will not be a surprise to hear that children and young people who enjoy reading have a significantly higher average reading score (Annual Literacy Survey 2024). What is more, the same survey shows a higher average score in children and young people who read daily. When we invited parents in during Book Week to read with their children, we had a great response which supported the love of sharing a good book. We are also blessed with a number of dedicated members of the West Meon village who regularly join us to listen to individual readers; our thanks to you all. Our 'Extreme Reading Challenge' was a great success and we had some super photos of children reading in most unusual places.

Our year 1 & 2 learners recently took a trip to Fort Nelson

as part of their educational experience. They have been learning about significant people in history and have investigated Florence Nightingale's impact on the treatment of soldiers and her contribution to modern day nursing. The children had an amazing time, the activities they took part in were designed to engage the learners - especially the tour by Florence Nightingale herself!

With support from the Touchett Trust, we are able to encourage children at our school to



learn musical instruments. We are endeavouring to put together a musical evening before the end of term, to share the enjoyment of music and singing and to give these young people a chance to perform. We also have an Annual Egg Rolling event on the last day of term which we are very much looking forward to.

If you have an interest, you may have already read our Ofsted report which states 'pupils are happy at this

caring village school'. It cites our ambitious curriculum and our offer of 'a wide range of opportunities to develop pupils' talents and interests positively'. As part of their evaluation process, the inspectors judge the way the curriculum and the school's wider activities support pupils to be confident, resilient and independent, and to develop strength of character. ### Meon Valley Active Retirement Association (MVARA) Keep Fit

MVARA firmly believes that an active lifestyle is key to enjoying good health during retirement age. We aim to provide regular opportunities to get out and about and keep fit.

Offering opportunities for members to be physically active can be challenging, both because there is already a significant number of established local groups in existence and because members' enthusiasm and drive need always to be tempered by the activities being responsibly and safely managed. Consequently, MVARA offers: Tai Chi at three levels led by a very experienced, qualified instructor; Table Tennis, an activity noted for being a sport which involves no physical contact and no high impact movement which can damage joints, emphasising, as it does movement, stretching, hand-eye co-ordination and quick reflexes.

MVARA believes that proper, safe physical activity should be for the benefit of the participants and not for the benefit of physiotherapists who often have to come along and repair any damage done when groups are not well regulated.

Fitting firmly in with this is the very popular weekly Keep Fit Class, which is run expertly by Chee Price in St Peter's Church Hall on Monday mornings. The Group has been running for a number of years and is frequently so popular that it has to operate with a waiting list – membership being kept at an agreed level in order to ensure that there is appropriate instruction and supervision so that exercises are completed properly and safely.

Exercises involve:

• Strengthening – to help to maintain lean muscle mass, bone density and to improve mobility and heart health;

 Balance – to help to prevent falls, by improving, stability, co-ordination and posture - a basic component of all other physical activities;



• Stretching – to help to maintain muscle and tendon elasticity, thus keeping tissues supple and resilient, and reducing the risk of injury;

• Core Stability – to reinforce the benefits of the other activities: a strong core helps to maintain balance; prevent falls; improve posture; ease movement; reduce the likelihood of back pain;

• Paired Circuits – to finish off, with participants working together and supporting each other.

But, of course, the circuits are not really where the session 'finishes off'. The true finish is provided by tea, coffee and a chat and let us not underestimate the importance of this finish. Experts will talk about the importance of relaxation after exercise in order to: repair microscopic muscle damage; to replenish glycogen; to reduce fatigue. It does all those things, but probably more importantly it offers the opportunity to catch up and interact with friends and this brings together the physical and the mental aspects of a healthy active lifestyle.

On Friday 9th May we will be hosting a special evening to commemorate the **80th ANNIVERSARY OF VE DAY** 


